READER: A reading from the Word of God written in the

Acts of the Apostles, the eighth chapter, beginning

at the twenty-sixth verse.

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region,

he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

READER: The Word of the Lord. **PEOPLE:** Thanks be to God.

Now on that same day two of Jesus' disciples were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have taken place there in these days?" He asked them, "What things?" They replied, "The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see him." Then he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared!

Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?" Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

THE NICENE CREED

These persons appointed, assembled before the Bishop, say together:

Right Reverend Father in God, we present Stephanie Delores, Michelle Inga, Sharon Amanda, Sharon Ocena, Edith Eudora, Richard Orlando, Reudon Athelston and Adzil Irad to be ordained to the office of Deacon in the Church of God.

BISHOP: You understand that the persons whom you

present to be ordained must be suited spiritually, morally and by sound learning to exercise their ministry to the honour of God

and the building up of His Church?

PRESENTERS: We have enquired of them and also examined them and believe them so to be.

The Bishop says to those who are to be ordained

Do you believe that God has called you to the office and work of Deacon in His Church?

ANSWER: I believe that God has so called me.

The Bishop presents the candidates to the people, and says,

Those whose duty it is to inquire about these persons and examine them have found them to be of godly life and sound learning, and believe them to be duly called to serve God in this ministry. Nevertheless, if any of you know any impediment or crime in them, on account of which they should not be ordained, come forward now, and make it known.

BISHOP: Is it therefore your will that they should be

ordained?

PEOPLE: It is.

BISHOP: Will you uphold them in their ministry?

ANSWER: We will.

THE CHARGE

The people sit. The ordinands stand before the Bishop who says,

Stephanie Delores, Michelle Inga, Sharon Amanda, Sharon Ocena, Edith Eudora, Richard Orlando, Reudon Athelston and Adzil Irad, every Christian is called to follow Jesus Christ, serving God the Father, through the power of the Holy Spirit.

A Deacon is called to serve the Church of God and work with its members in caring for the poor, the needy, the sick, and all who are in trouble. A Deacon is to strengthen the faithful, search out the careless and the indifferent, and to preach the word of God as duly authorized by the Bishop.

As a Deacon in the Church you are to study the Holy Scriptures, to seek nourishment from them, and to model your life upon them. By your word and example, you are to make Christ and His redemptive love known to those among whom you live and work and worship; and to interpret to the Church their needs, concerns and hopes. You are to assist the Bishop and Priests in public worship and in the administration of God's Word and Sacraments, and in carrying out other duties assigned to you from time to time. At all times your life and teaching are to show Christ's people that in serving those in need, they are serving Christ Himself.

THE EXAMINATION

The Bishop says to those who are to be ordained.

In order that we may know your mind and purpose, and that you may be strengthened in your resolve to fulfill your ministry, you must answer the questions we now put to you.

BISHOP: Do you now in the presence of God and this

congregation commit yourself to this trust and

responsibility?

ANSWER: I do.

BISHOP: Do you accept the Holy Scriptures as uniquely

revealing the word of God and containing all things necessary for eternal salvation through

faith in Jesus Christ?

ANSWER: I do so accept them.

BISHOP: Do you believe the Christian faith as taught in the holy Scriptures, held by the undivided Church and declared in the Catholic creeds; and in your ministry will you expound and teach it?

ANSWER: I believe it, and will so do.

BISHOP: Will you be diligent in the reading and study of

the holy Scriptures, and in seeking the knowledge of such things as may deepen your faith and make you a stronger and more able

minister of Christ.

ANSWER: I will, by the help of God.

BISHOP: Will you accept the discipline of this Church,

and reverently obey your Bishop and other

ministers set over you in the Lord?

ANSWER: I will, by the help of God.

BISHOP: Will you do your best to pattern your life and that

of your family or household in accordance with the teachings of Christ, so that you may be a

wholesome example to all people?

ANSWER: I will, by the help of God.

BISHOP: Will you look for Christ in all others and be

ready to help and serve those in need?

ANSWER: I will, by the help of God.

BISHOP: Will you be diligent in prayer, both in public and

private, in the recitation of Morning and Evening Prayer, and in such things as may increase your

love for God?

ANSWER: I will, by the help of God.

BISHOP: Almighty God who has given you the will to do

all these things, give you also the grace and power to perform them, that He may complete that work which He has begun in you, through

Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The people kneel as the ordinands prostrate.

The Bishop then says,

The Scriptures tell us that our Saviour Christ spent the whole night in prayer before He chose and sent forth His twelve apostles. Likewise, the apostles prayed before they appointed Matthias to be one of their number. Let us, therefore, follow their examples, and offer our prayers to Almighty God before we ordain *Stephanie Delores, Michelle Inga, Sharon Amanda, Sharon Ocena, Edith Eudora, Richard Orlando, Reudon Athelston and Adzil Irad* for the work to which we trust the Holy Spirit has called them.

this ministry, build up Your Church, and glorify your name, we pray to you, O Lord.

PEOPLE: Lord, hear our prayer.

LITANIST: That by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit *they*

may be sustained and encouraged to persevere

to the end, we pray to you, O Lord.

PEOPLE: Lord, hear our prayer.

LITANIST: For all who fear God and believe in you, Lord

Christ, that our divisions may cease and that all may be one as you and the Father are one, we

pray to you, O Lord.

PEOPLE: Lord, hear our prayer.

LITANIST: For the mission of the Church, that in faithful

witness it may preach the gospel to the ends of

the earth, we pray to you, O Lord.

PEOPLE: Lord, hear our prayer.

LITANIST: For those who do not yet believe, and for those

who have lost their faith, that they may receive the light of the gospel, we pray to you, O Lord.

PEOPLE: Lord, hear our prayer.

LITANIST: For ourselves: for the forgiveness of our sins

LITANIST: Rejoicing in the fellowship of the ever-blessed

Virgin Mary, *blessed Philip* and all the saints, let us commend ourselves and one another, and

all our life to Christ our God.

PEOPLE: To you, O Lord.

The Bishop prays,

Almighty and eternal God, ruler of all things in heaven and earth, mercifully accept the prayers of your people, and strengthen us to do your will; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

PEOPLE: Amen.

The Bishop commends those who are to be ordained to the prayers of the people and silence is kept.

All still kneeling.

THE HYMN, "Veni Creator Spiritus", is sung

Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire, and lighten with celestial fire; thou the anointing Spirit art, who dost thy sevenfold gifts impar.

Thy blessèd unction from above is comfort, life, and fire of love; enable with perpetual light the dullness of our blinded sight.

Anoint and cheer our soiled face with the abundance of thy grace; keep far our foes, give peace at home; where thou art Guide no ill can come.

Teach us to know the Father, Son, and thee, of both, to be but one; that through the ages all along this may be our endless song.

'Praise to thy eternal merit, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.' Amen.

THE CONSECRATION AND ORDINATION

The ordinands kneel before the Bishop, he stretches out his hands towards them, and says,

We praise and glorify you, most merciful Father, because in your great love you sent your only Son Jesus Christ to take the form of a servant; He came to serve and not to be served; and taught us that He who would be great among us must be servant of all; He humbled Himself for our sake, and in obedience accepted death, even death on a cross; therefore you highly exalted Him and gave Him the name which is above every name.

And now we give you thanks that you have called these your servants, whom we ordain in your Name, to share the ministry, entrusted to your Church.

Here the Bishop lays his hands on the head of each ordinand, and says,

Send down your Holy Spirit upon your servant *Stephanie / Michelle / Sharon / Sharon / Edith / Richard / Reudon / Adzil* for the office and work of a Deacon in your Church.

The Bishop then continues,

Almighty Father, give *them* grace and power to fulfill *their* ministry. Make *them* faithful to serve, ready to teach, constant in advancing your gospel, and grant that, always having full assurance of faith, abounding in hope, and being rooted and grounded in love, *they* may continue strong and steadfast in your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and your Holy Spirit, belong all glory and honour, worship and praise, now and for ever.

PEOPLE: Amen.

The Bishop addresses each of the newly ordained Deacons

Stephanie / Michelle / Sharon / Sharon / Edith / Richard / Reudon / Adzil, receive authority for the office and work of a Deacon in the Church of God; in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

PEOPLE: Amen.

THE VESTING OF THE DEACONS

Each of the newly ordained Deacons is vested according to custom by the attending ministers:

- The Reverend Canon Dr. Sonia S. J. Hinds Rector of St. Leonard Church Rural Dean of the St. Michael Deanery
- The Reverend Canon Beverley B. Sealy-Knight Rector, St. James Parish Church Rural Dean of the St. Peter Deanery
- The Reverend Canon Trevor S. O'Neale
 Rector of St. Philip Parish Church
 Rural Dean of the Christ Church Deanery

The Bishop lays the stole on the newly ordained Deacon's left shoulder to be arranged and fastened by the attending ministers.

BISHOP: Take this stole as from the hand of God that you will fulfill your ministry for it is He who

gives you the increase of grace.

The Bishop, assisted by the attending ministers, puts on the newly ordained Deacon the Dalmatic saying,

The Lord clothe you with the garment of salvation, the robe of joy and the dalmatic of righteousness.

The Bishop gives to the newly ordained Deacon the New Testament, saying,

Receive this book and take authority to proclaim the Gospel and to assist in the administration of the Sacraments.

At the conclusion of the Vesting, the Bishop introduces the new Deacons and invites a congratulatory applicate from the congregation.

THE GREETING OF PEACE

BISHOP: The Son of man came not to be served but to

serve, and to give His life a ransom for many.

THE DISTINCTIVE (VOCATIONAL) DIACONATE

The Diocese of Barbados is answering the call to provide what has come to be called the Vocational/Perpetual Diaconate, but our preferred term will be the Distinctive Diaconate. Unlike the Transitional Diaconate where the deacon goes through a period of training primarily to become a priest in the near future, within the Distinctive Diaconate, the deacon is focused, not on preparing for the priesthood, but on evangelism, outreach and community engagement, that of taking the Church to the community and bringing the needs of the community to the Church. Our Diocese has over the years only followed the transitional model, but today we move toward the phase of having Distinctive Deacons; and this gives the true value to this high calling of the Deacon who was essentially, within the early Church, the Bishop's agent, ambassador, and messenger such that the people of God might be better served.

Within the Lambeth Conference in 1958, the following Resolution [88] was offered to restore the Office of Deacon to its rightful place:

The Conference recommends that each province of the Anglican Communion shall consider whether the office of deacon shall be restored to its primitive place as a distinctive order in the Church, instead of being regarded as a probationary period for the priesthood.

Then at the next Lambeth Conference of 1968, this Resolution [32] on the Diaconate was proffered:

 ${\it The \ Conference \ recommends:}$

- (a) That the diaconate, combining service of others with liturgical functions, be open to
 - 1. Men and women remaining in secular occupations,
 - 2. Full-time church workers,
 - 3. Those selected for priesthood.
- (b) That Ordinals should, where necessary, be revised:
 - 1. To take account of the new role envisaged for the diaconate;
 - 2. By the removal of reference to the diaconate as 'an inferior office';
 - 3. By emphasis upon the continuing element of diakonia in the ministry of bishops and priests.

It is important to note then the call and the appropriate instruments which were put in place at the prominent level to ensure that the Order of Deacon be returned to its primitive pristine state which became sullied sometime around the fourth century. We too in the Province of the West Indies were not inattentive as can be seen in our Constitution and Canons: Article 5: RELATING TO DEACONS where it is stated:

- 1. The Order of Deacons shall be maintained within the Church in the Province of the West Indies as a distinct Order of ministry, within the threefold Order of the historic ministry of Bishops, Priests, and Deacons. The Diaconate as the ancient Order, symbolic of the servant element in ministry, has an inherent dignity which is preserved in the other Orders of ministry.
- 2. The specific functions of members of the Order shall include:
 - a. Preparing the Table and assisting with the Chalice.
 - b. Reading of the Gospel at the Eucharist.
 - c. Baptising in the absence of the Priest.
 - d. Preaching by the Bishop's Licence.
 - e. Visiting the sick and disabled.
 - f. Reporting to the Incumbent those who are in need.
 - g. Generally assisting the Incumbent in the pastoral work of the Parish.
- 3. Members of the Order may be required to undergo a process of suitable internship in the ministry of the pastorate.

The Church in the Province of the West Indies properly understands and therefore has enunciated its position that the Order of Deacons is a full and distinct Order with full integrity; and at the time of Ordination as reflected in our service, the person(s) to be ordained is(are) made aware of the expectations of the Church as expressed in The Charge. Here too, in the Book of Common Prayer, our Province made the necessary adjustment to underscore the fact of the fullness and distinctiveness of the Order of Deacons.

Our newly ordained Distinctive Deacons will ensure that the Servant Church is always present, active, and visible. These types of Deacons "have a strong call to an outward-looking and community-minded ministry."
