### Overview of the Season for 2025

# THEME: PEACE WITH CREATION

The 2025 Symbol depicting the 'Garden of Peace' is inspired by Isaiah 32:14-18.

The fortress will be abandoned, the noisy city deserted; citadel and watchtower will become a wasteland forever, the delight of donkeys, a pasture for flocks, <sup>15</sup> till the Spirit is poured on us from on high, and the desert becomes a fertile field, and the fertile field seems like a forest. <sup>16</sup> The Lord's justice will dwell in the desert, his righteousness live in the fertile field.

- <sup>17</sup> The fruit of that righteousness will be peace; its effect will be quietness and confidence forever.
- <sup>18</sup> My people will live in peaceful dwelling places, in secure homes, in undisturbed places of rest.

The cover design is the logo for this year's observance. It depicts a dove with an olive branch in its beak flying over a tree which exists in contrasting conditions. The left side of the tree is rooted in an arid region which results in the tree being dried and deprived of nutrients. The right side of the tree is rooted in fertile conditions which results in a healthy and lush appearance.

The arid conditions in this scene are the result of humanity's impact on the creation, while the verdant conditions reflect the hope that abounds if humanity ceases its destructive assault on the creation. The dove is flying from the arid region to the flourishing region with the olive branch as a reminder of the restoration of the earth after the destruction of the creation in Genesis' account of Noah and the Ark.

The scene ties in with Isaiah's vision of the desolation and destruction of the creation due to humanity's activity. The call to "Peace with Creation" is one for reconciliation and repentance which is best understood in the Greek word *metanoia* which is best translated "a change of mind or direction".

The Season of Creation has its genesis in 1989 through a proposal by Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios I, also known as the 'Green Patriarch', of the Orthodox Church that September 1<sup>st</sup> be designated as a Day of Prayer for Creation. Over the years this came to be accepted by the Worldwide Council of Churches, the Roman Catholic Church, the Anglican Communion and others, and has developed into not simply a day of prayer but a season spanning from September 1st (Creation Day) to October 4th (The Feast of St. Francis of Assisi-The patron saint of ecology). Each year the season carries a theme which calls the faithful to focus on some aspect of the creation. Over time through the collaboration of the ecumenical partners mentioned above, a lectionary has also been developed for the season along the lines of the triennial cycle around which the entire lectionary is structured. Though this has not been officially adopted by all the ecumenical partners, it is deemed as one of several forms that may be utilised during the season.

In the Diocese of Barbados, we have adopted the triennial lectionary for the season to provide a more intentioned focus for each Sunday, along the lines of the general theme designated for the year. This year being Lectionary Year C of our cycle, the readings for the season of creation are those prepared for year 3.
